## RE: Connect America Fund, WC Docket No. 10-90

Dear Ms. Dortch:

On Wednesday, March 8, 2017, the undersigned, on behalf of NTCA–The Rural Broadband Association ("NTCA"), spoke via telephone with Claude Aiken, legal advisor to Commissioner Mignon Clyburn, regarding matters in the above-referenced proceeding.

The conversation was a follow-on to several recent prior discussions regarding the continuing adverse effects upon consumers arising out of application of the "rate floor" policy. See Ex Parte Letters from Michael R. Romano, Sr. Vice President, NTCA, to Marlene H. Dortch, Secretary, Federal Communications Commission (the "Commission"), WC Docket No. 10-90 (filed Feb. 3, 2017; February 23, 2017; March 6, 2017). Consistent with those prior discussions, NTCA urged the Commission again to act promptly upon prior filings to address concerns with respect to the rate floor. See, e.g., Application for Review of NTCA, et al., WC Docket No. 10-90 (filed Jan. 21, 2015); Petition for Reconsideration of NTCA, et al., WC Docket No. 10-90 (filed Aug. 4, 2014), at 10-11 (asking the Commission to review the methodology by which the rate floor is set and to "consider staying implementation of additional phase-in steps mandated by the Order pending full consideration of alternative rate floor calculation options in the context of a reconsideration proceeding or, if necessary, a further rulemaking proceeding.") NTCA noted that the rate floor policy yields no benefits with respect to managing universal service fund budgets, but at this point - after several years of serial rate increases - is only harmful and disruptive to rural consumers, especially given that the lack of affordable standalone broadband services makes it more difficult for those same rural consumers to cease purchasing voice service even as it becomes increasingly expensive. NTCA therefore observed that an immediate pause to any further rate floor increase would only help rural consumers and afford the Commission reasonable time to consider on a more informed basis any next steps with respect to the policy.
